
Parking Validation for Saturday & Sunday Mass ONLY

Dear Cathedral Parishioners,

The Church echoes the choir of angels that sang God's praises on the night of our Savior's Birth: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests" (Luke 2:14). This song that remained dormant during Advent now explodes in joy and solemn festivity. The Gloria has its roots in Christmas, and expresses our thanks to God for the Incarnation. This is what we celebrate: In Jesus Christ, the Lord became one of us to save us from sin.

Christmas is not limited to December 25. Rather, it is celebrated as an octave or eight-day feast (December 25 – January 1). The Christmas Octave begins with the Nativity of the Lord on December 25, continues with the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph on December 26, and concludes with the Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God on January 1.

Christmas is also a liturgical season that extends beyond the Octave. It includes the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord (January 2), and ends with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord (January 9). Epiphany, which is also known as Three Kings Day, commemorates the visit of the Magi, when Christ was revealed as the Savior of all peoples. There is a venerable custom of blessing homes on Epiphany, since the feast recalls the visit of the Magi to Christ's "home" in Bethlehem (Matthew 2:1–12). I will provide all families with a prayer they can use for this blessing.

To help us celebrate Christmas in its fullness, all of the decorations inside and outside of the church will remain in place throughout the season. You might consider doing the same with your decorations at home.

I also encourage you to continue praying the Angelus. Whereas Advent focused on Mary's welcoming of God ("Be it done unto me according to thy Word"), Christmas focuses on the result of her "yes" to the Lord: the Incarnation ("And the word was made flesh and dwelt among us"). I encourage you to continue praying the Angelus at home during the Christmas season.

I pray that this holy season may draw us close to the Lord, who in his goodness has drawn close to us.
