Mass on Thanksgiving Day Thursday, November 23 | 9:00 a.m.

Attending Mass on Thanksgiving Day is the perfect way to offer thanks to God. Thanksgiving is an essential feature of the Eucharistic Celebration and gives rise to the name "Eucharist." According to the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, "It is called: Eucharist, because it is an action of thanksgiving to God. The Greek words *eucharistein* and *eulogein* recall the Jewish blessings that proclaim—especially during a meal—God's works: creation, redemption, and sanctification" (no. 1328).

Thanksgiving Day is also, in a sense, the anniversary of the dedication of the Cathedral of the Sacred Heart (November 29, 1906). The consecration of the Cathedral was scheduled on this quintessential American holiday to symbolize the compatibility of the Catholic faith and American society, and the determination of Virginia's Catholics to participate in it.

Financial Corner

The Cathedral has withdrawn \$117,000 from its endowment fund to pay for normal operating expenses. Fr. Tony made this decision upon the recommendation of the finance council. Even with this withdrawal, the parish is projected to have a cash shortfall of \$43,000 by the end of the fiscal year (June 30, 2024). The current situation reflects the trend of falling offertory income over the past five years (since 2018), compounded by rising prices. Parishioners are kindly asked to consider increasing their offertory contributions to help cover this deficit, as expenses have already been significantly reduced.

WORSHIP

Rites of Acceptance and Welcoming Sunday, November 19 | 9:00 a.m., 11:00 a.m.

Two liturgical rites mark a person's formal entrance into the catechumenate—the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) which is the process of instruction for membership in the Catholic Church.

The Rite of Acceptance into the Order of Catechumens (9:00 a.m.) publicly recognizes the aspiration of those who are unbaptized to enter the Catholic Church by receiving the three sacraments of Christian Initiation: Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist. Official candidates for baptism are called catechumens.

The Rite of Welcoming the Candidates (11:00 a.m.) acknowledges the intention of baptized persons who wish to prepare for the sacraments of Confirmation and the Eucharist. These candidates include persons baptized in another Christian denomination who seek to enter into full communion with the Catholic Church, and those baptized as Catholics who did not receive instruction in the faith.

Christ the King

Next Sunday is the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. The Collector opening prayer for that Mass indicates the purpose of the celebration: Almighty ever-living God, whose will is to restore all things in your beloved Son, the king of the universe, grant, we pray, that the whole creation, set free from slavery, may render your majesty service and ceaselessly proclaim your praise."

This petition is drawn from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans (8:18-27). As Christians, we believe and hope that Christ, who is Lord of the world and its history, will renew the universe when he comes again at the end of time. In this way, Christ's Second Coming (Parousia) will seal the definitive victory won by his passion, death, and resurrection (Catechism of the Catholic Church, nos. 668, 671).

Eucharistic Procession

November 25–26

A Eucharistic procession will take place at all Masses (except the Sunday 9:00 a.m.) to commemorate the 118 th anniversary of the dedication of the Cathedral (November 29, 1906). A Eucharistic procession offers the faithful an opportunity to give public witness to their faith and devotion to the Eucharist, which is Christ himself.

Notes from the Choir Loft: Sunday's Motet

"God Be in My Head": This 16th century Sarum prayer (from Salisbury, England) places God in the center of everyday life at every moment, in every bodily sense. The text implores God to be in one's head and understanding, eyes and looking, mouth and speaking, heart and thinking. Finally, the text asks for God to be at one's end and departing. Famed composer John Rutter (b. 1945), allows the text to shine in this simple, beautiful setting.

Sacristans

Sacristans are liturgical ministers whose service helps to ensure a worthy and reverent celebration of Mass (General Instruction of the Roman Missal, no. 105b). Volunteers are needed to help set up for Mass and clean up afterwards. Duties include arranging the liturgical books, sacred vessels, and other items. There would be two time slots for sacristans: 45 minutes before Mass for preparation, and 20 minutes afterward to put things away. Parishioners could volunteer for either or both time slots, choosing which weekends they would be available. Scheduling would take place through the parish's online scheduler.
