

“She Is Indeed Our Mother”: A Holy Hour in Honor of Our Lady of Fatima Tuesday, May 21 | 6:00–7:00 pm

The parish’s next monthly holy hour will focus on Our Lady of Fatima, whose feast day is celebrated on May 13. This feast commemorates apparition of the Virgin Mary to three Portuguese shepherd children in 1917.

The format of the holy hour will be Eucharistic Exposition and Benediction, and will include the Office of Readings from the Liturgy of the Hours. The Office of Readings will feature a sermon by St. Aelred of Rievaulx (1110–1167), an English monk. He declared in that sermon that the Virgin Mary “is indeed our mother, for through her we have been born, not for the world but for God.”

Confirmation

Congratulations to the young people of the parish receiving the sacrament of Confirmation.

This sacrament "is called *Confirmation* because it confirms and strengthens baptismal grace" (*Compendium to the Catechism of the Catholic Church*, no. 266). Furthermore, "The effect of Confirmation is a special outpouring of the Holy Spirit like that of Pentecost. ...It roots the recipient more deeply in divine sonship, binds him more firmly to Christ and to the Church and reinvigorates the gifts of the Holy Spirit in his soul. It gives a special strength to witness to the Christian faith" (no. 268).

Notes for the Choir Loft

Sunday's Motet

Gerald Near (b. 1942) is an American composer whose works have been widely broadcast by National Public Radio (NPR). He studied with legendary American organist and composer Leo Sowerby at the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago, and apprenticed with Swiss conductor Gustav Meier. Near's *Spiritus Domini* ("The Spirit of the Lord") takes the form of a choral fantasia, where the Gregorian melody *Veni, Creator Spiritus* is "disguised" among the various voices.

Cathedral Foundation Organ Campaign

Turning "Pipe" Dreams Into Reality

Voicing is underway for the new gallery pipe organ. This is the process by which each of the 4,336 pipes are manipulated to optimally speak (or sound) into the Cathedral's unique acoustic. Every pipe must be evenly controlled for the correct volume and timbre (tone quality), whether it be bright, dark, loud, or soft. Hundreds of parameters and decisions with regard to the speech (or onset of tone) of every pipe are considered, so that a pipe constructed to sound like a cello, for example, does not sound like a flute.

What is Eucharistic Adoration?

Eucharistic adoration refers to worship of the Blessed Sacrament, usually when it is exposed on the altar. This worship of the Eucharist flows from Mass and leads back to it. "Exposition of the holy eucharist... is intended to acknowledge Christ's marvelous presence in the sacrament. Exposition invites us to the spiritual union with him that culminates in sacramental communion" (*Holy Communion and the Worship of the Eucharist outside Mass*, no. 82).

Lectors

Parishioners are welcome to serve as lectors at Sunday Mass. Lectors must be baptized Catholics, have received their First Holy Communion, attend Mass each Sunday and holy days of obligation, and, if married, be married in the Catholic Church.

The ministry of lector is also open to young people who are at least in the 6th grade, and who are enrolled in a Catholic school or religious education program.

The *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* states that lectors should be "people who are truly suited to carrying out this function and carefully prepared, so that by their hearing the readings from the sacred texts the faithful may conceive in their hearts a sweet and living affection for Sacred Scripture" (no. 101). First Holy Communion

The sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood is received when a child is seven years old and in second grade. It is preceded by the sacrament of Penance. To receive First Penance and First Holy Communion, a child must already be baptized in the Catholic Church and enrolled in catechesis (home, parish, or Catholic school). Several preparation sessions are also required. Preparation for First Penance takes place in January and preparation for First Holy Communion takes place in April. Youth Confirmation

Confirmation for young people is normally received at age fifteen and in tenth grade. This sacrament is a special outpouring of the Holy Spirit that strengthens a person to live out the Catholic faith. To be confirmed, a young person must already be baptized in the Catholic Church and enrolled in catechesis (home, parish, or Catholic school). Preparation sessions (September–May) are also required. Interested in Becoming a Catholic?

RCIA Inquiry Session

May 29 | 6:00 pm | Parish office

The process of becoming a member of the Catholic church is called the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA), and follows the mission commanded by Jesus Christ: "Go forth and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit." (Matthew 28:19). Come to the RCIA inquiry session to learn more.

Adult Confirmation

Adult Confirmation is for Catholic adults who have already received Baptism and First Holy Communion. Confirmation is one of the sacraments of Christian Initiation. With this sacrament, a person receives the power of the Holy Spirit to give witness to Christ. For more information, please contact Maria Thorsen (mthorsen@richmondcathedral.org).

Receiving Holy Communion

The National Eucharistic Revival seeks to help American Catholics deepen their devotion to the Eucharist. The reverence shown in receiving Holy Communion professes the Catholic belief that Christ is truly present in the Eucharist: body and blood, soul and divinity (Council of Trent, 1551).

"When receiving Holy Communion, the communicant bows his or her head before the Sacrament as a gesture of reverence and receives the Body of the Lord from the minister. The consecrated host may be received either on the tongue or in the hand, at the discretion of each communicant. ... The Priest raises the host slightly and shows it to each, saying, The Body of Christ. The communicant replies, Amen, and receives the Sacrament either on the tongue or, where this is allowed, in the hand, the choice lying with the communicant. As soon as the communicant receives the host, he or she consumes the whole of it" (*General Instruction of the Roman Missal*, nos. 160 §3, 161).

Marriage in the Church

"Since marriage establishes the couple in a public state of life in the Church, it is fitting that its celebration be public, in the framework of a liturgical celebration, before the priest (or a witness authorized by the Church), the witnesses, and the assembly of the faithful" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, no. 1663).

In order for a Catholic to be validly married, he or she must normally be married in the Church; that is, in the presence of a priest or deacon (*Code of Canon Law*, canon 1108 §1). Being married in the Church does not require that a Catholic's spouse be or become a Catholic.
