

The Cathedral is on track to spend over \$609,000 (30% of the budget) for payroll and benefits. This amount compensates the rector, staff, and paid choir members. To pay for this operational expense, together with insurance and utilities, the parish seeks to collect \$18,500 per week. Parisioners' continued support to meet this goal is appreciated.

Annual Diocesan Appeal

This annual collection is ongoing. The Cathedral's goal during this Jubilee Year is \$58,940 (out of a total diocesan target of \$4,676,409). The parish receives back 20% of the funds received up to the goal (\$11,788), and 50% of the funds above the goal. Last year, the Cathedral received back \$33,051. Use the QR code to donate. Easter Time

Easter is not just one day (Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord) but rather a full liturgical season: "The fifty days from Easter Sunday to Pentecost are celebrated in joyful exultation as one feast day, or better as one 'great Sunday.' These above all others are the days for the singing of the Alleluia" (General Norms for the Liturgical Year and the Calendar, no. 22).

Divine Mercy Sunday

The Second Sunday of Easter is the octave (eighth) day of Easter, in which each day is as important as Easter Sunday itself. Today is also the Sunday of Divine Mercy. Pope St. John Paul II established Divine Mercy Sunday in canonizing St. Faustina Kowalska (1905–1938), a member of the Congregation of Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy. St. Faustina received visions of Christ centered on the theme of divine mercy.

The readings and prayers for today's Mass develop this motif, as indicated in the Collect (opening prayer): "God of everlasting mercy, who in the very recurrence of the paschal feast kindle the faith of the people you have made your own..."

Cathedral Foundation Organ Campaign Turning "Pipe" Dreams Into Reality

The Cathedral's *grand orgue* ("great organ," to distinguish it from the choir- and continuo organs) has performed well during its first Holy Week and Easter. All the stops were drawn for the diocesan Chrism Mass (including both 32' ranks!) and all three Easter liturgies. Whereas the former instrument could barely be heard in a crowded Cathedral church, the 67 stops of the new instrument are able to keep up with the demands of this week.

Spiritual Works of Mercy

There are seven spiritual works of mercy: (1) instructing the ignorant, (2) counseling the doubtful, (3) admonishing the sinner, (4) forgiving offenses, (5) comforting the afflicted, (6) bearing wrongs patiently, and (7) praying for the living and the dead.

"The works of mercy are charitable actions by which we come to the aid of our neighbor in his spiritual and bodily necessities" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church,* no. 2447). These deeds fulfill Christ's teaching inscribed on the Cathedral's façade: IF YE LOVE ME KEEP MY COMMANDMENTS (John 14:15).

Rosary Ministry

Monday-Friday | 3:00 pm | St. Mary's Hospital

The Rosary Ministry at St. Mary's Hospital needs volunteers. Rosary Ministry volunteers pray the rosary on weekdays throughout the year, with a particular need on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. The rosary is prayed in the chapel, usually by two volunteers, while being televised through closed circuit TV, directly to the patients' rooms, so they can pray along.

Lectors

Parishioners are welcome to serve as lectors at Sunday Mass. Lectors must be baptized Catholics, have received their First Holy Communion, attend Mass each Sunday and holy days of obligation, and, if married, be married in the Catholic Church.

The ministry of lector is also open to young people who are at least in the 6th grade, and who are enrolled in a Catholic school or religious education program.

The *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* states that lectors should be "people who are truly suited to carrying out this function and carefully prepared, so that by their hearing the readings from the sacred texts the faithful may conceive in their hearts a sweet and living affection for Sacred Scripture" (no. 101). CHILDREN & YOUTH

Catechesis

Catechesis designates religious education. The term is derived from the Greek *eche* (echo), in the sense of the Catholic faith "resounding" by means of instruction. Religious education is available for all ages: children, youth, and adult.

Pope St. John Paul II taught that, "The definitive aim of catechesis is to put people not only in touch but in communion, in intimacy, with Jesus Christ: only He can lead us to the love of the Father in the Spirit and make us share in the life of the Holy Trinity" (*Catechesi tradendae*, no. 5 §3).

First Holy Communion

Every Catholic remembers receiving the Eucharist for the first time. This sacrament contains the Real Presence of Jesus Christ and strengthens our union with him.

First Holy Communion normally takes place when a child is seven years old and in 2nd grade. Please pray for the students preparing to receive their first Holy Communion: Anna, Dylan, Evangelista (Eva), George, James, John (Jack), John Travis (JT), Kathleen, Leo, Solei, Thomas, Varick, and Wyeth.

Jubilee 2025

Pilgrims of Hope

"Signs of hope are also needed by those who are the very embodiment of hope, namely, the young. Sadly, they often see their dreams and aspirations frustrated. We must not disappoint them, for the future depends on their enthusiasm. It is gratifying to see the energy they demonstrate, for example, by rolling up their sleeves and volunteering to help when disasters strike and people are in need. Yet it is sad to see young people who are without hope, who face an uncertain and unpromising future, who lack employment or job security, or realistic prospects after finishing school. Without the hope that their dreams can come true, they will inevitably grow discouraged and listless. ... For this reason, the Jubilee should inspire the Church to make greater efforts to reach out to them. With renewed passion, let us demonstrate care and concern for adolescents, students and young couples, the rising generation. Let us draw close to the young, for they are the joy and hope of the Church and of the world!" (Bull of Indiction of the Jubilee Year, Spes non confundit, no. 22 §1).

The Jubilee Cross will remain in the sanctuary throughout the year so that the faithful can venerate it. Parishioners are encouraged to pray the Jubilee prayer that has been placed near the Cross

Easter Duty

"All the faithful, after they have been initiated into the Eucharist, are obliged to receive Holy Communion at least once a year. This precept must be fulfilled in paschal time, but for a just cause it may be fulfilled at another time of year" (*Code of Canon Law*, canon 920).

This Easter duty applies to all who have made their First Holy Communion and who are properly disposed to receive the Eucharist. In the United States, the Easter Duty must be fulfilled between Palm Sunday (April 13) and Trinity Sunday (June 15).

The obligation to receive the sacrament of Penance is related to the Easter duty: "After having reached the age of discretion [approximately age seven], each member of the faithful is obliged to confess faithfully his or her grave sins at least once a year" (canon 989).

Lay Vocation

Vatican Council II (1962–1965) taught that lay people have their own grand and noble calling—to consecrate human civilization to God through daily life and work: "The laity... seek the kingdom of God by engaging in temporal affairs and by ordering them according to the plan of God. They live in the world... in all of the secular professions and occupations. They live in the ordinary circumstances of family and social life... They are called there by God that... they may work for the sanctification of the world from within as a leaven" (*Lumen gentium*, no. 31 §2).
