WORSHIP

Easter Time

Easter is not just one day (Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord) but rather a full liturgical season: "The fifty days from Easter Sunday to Pentecost are celebrated in joyful exultation as one feast day, or better as one 'great Sunday.' These above all others are the days for the singing of the Alleluia" (General Norms for the Liturgical Year and the Calendar, no. 22).

Oueen of Heaven

The *Regina Caeli* (Queen of Heaven) antiphon is used throughout the Easter season. It is one of five antiphons in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary that are prayed according to the various liturgical seasons.

Queen of heaven, rejoice, alleluia. The Son whom you merited to bear, alleluia, has risen as he said, alleluia. Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary, alleluia! For the Lord has truly risen, alleluia!

Notes from the Choir Loft

Since its publication in 1860, *Panis Angelicus* by French composer César Franck (1822–1890) has become the best-known setting of the text written by St. Thomas Aquinas (ca. 1200). The music's immediate appeal could be attributed to its tight classical form, constructed by repeating a beautiful, simply-written theme. It is juxtaposed by a brief setting of another text by Aquinas: O Sacred Banquet.

Cathedral Foundation Organ Campaign Turning "Pipe" Dreams Into Reality

Most pipe organs have stops that undulate when two stops are pulled together, causing an ethereal effect. These are mostly known as *celestes* (heavenly). The sound of vibrating strings is made by drawing the *viole de Gambe* (a stop mimicking an early violin) and *voix celestes* (literally, "heavenly voice," the stop is intentionally out of tune to create the undulating effect). The gallery organ has another set of undulating pipes: the *dulciane* ("little sweetness," a soft string stop) - the *unda maris* ("wave of the sea," an intentionally out of tune, soft string stop).

Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion

The role of an extraordinary minister of Holy Communion is to help distribute the Eucharist at Mass, so that the celebration is not unduly prolonged, or to bring the sacrament to the sick.

Extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion must be fully initiated and practicing Catholics. This means that they have received Baptism, Confirmation, and First Holy Communion; that they practice their faith, which includes attending Mass each Sunday and holy day of obligation; and, that if married, they be in a marriage recognized by the Catholic Church.

Catechesis

Catechesis designates religious education. The term is derived from the Greek *eche* (echo), in the sense of the Catholic faith "resounding" by means of instruction. Religious education is available for all ages: children, youth, and adult.

Pope St. John Paul II taught that, "The definitive aim of catechesis is to put people not only in touch but in communion, in intimacy, with Jesus Christ: only He can lead us to the love of the Father in the Spirit and make us share in the life of the Holy Trinity" (*Catechesi tradendae*, no. 5 §3).

Pilgrims of Hope

"Signs of hope should also be shown to the sick, at home or in hospital. Their sufferings can be allayed by the closeness and affection of those who visit them. Works of mercy are also works of hope that give rise to immense gratitude. Gratitude should likewise be shown to all those healthcare workers who, often in precarious conditions, carry out their mission with constant care and concern for the sick and for those who are most vulnerable (Bull of Indiction of the Jubilee Year, *Spes non confundit*, no. 11 §1).

The Jubilee Cross will remain in the sanctuary throughout the year so that the faithful can venerate it. Parishioners are encouraged to pray the Jubilee prayer that has been placed near the Cross.

Easter Duty

"All the faithful, after they have been initiated into the Eucharist, are obliged to receive Holy Communion at least once a year. This precept must be fulfilled in paschal time, but for a just cause it may be fulfilled at another time of year" (*Code of Canon Law*, canon 920).

This Easter duty applies to all who have made their First Holy Communion and who are properly disposed to receive the Eucharist. In the United States, the Easter Duty must be fulfilled between Palm Sunday (April 13) and Trinity Sunday (June 15).

The obligation to receive the sacrament of Penance is related to the Easter duty: "After having reached the age of discretion [approximately age seven], each member of the faithful is obliged to confess faithfully his or her grave sins at least once a year" (canon 989).

Becoming a Catholic A Journey of Faith

Are you or anyone you know interested in becoming a Catholic? The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) is a process for learning about the Catholic faith. This spiritual journey is for adults who have not been baptized, those who have been baptized in another denomination, and adults who were baptized Catholic but did not receive instruction in the faith. Adults who are open to discerning their personal experience of faith and learning more about the Catholic Church are welcome to OCIA.
