WORSHIP

Easter Time

Easter is not just one day (Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord) but rather a full liturgical season: "The fifty days from Easter Sunday to Pentecost are celebrated in joyful exultation as one feast day, or better as one 'great Sunday.' These above all others are the days for the singing of the Alleluia" (*General Norms for the Liturgical Year and the Calendar*, no. 22).

Mary's Month

May is dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary. This month includes the feast of Our Lady of Fatima (May 13), which commemorates her apparition to the Portuguese shepherd children in 1917, and the feast of the Visitation (May 31).

Throughout this month, parishioners are encouraged to place flowers on the Mary altar, where vases are available.

The *Regina Caeli* (Queen of Heaven) antiphon will be sung before all Masses during May:

Queen of heaven, rejoice, alleluia. The Son whom you merited to bear, alleluia, has risen as he said, alleluia. Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary, alleluia! For the Lord has truly risen, alleluia!

Notes from the Choir Loft

The Cathedral Choir performs a choral setting of the popular American hymn "My Shepherd Will Supply My Need." It is arranged by Virgil Thomson (1896–1989), who (along with Aaron Copland) is credited with developing the "American Sound," an aesthetic evoking American landscapes. A graduate of Harvard University and recipient of the Pulitzer Prize for music, Thomson studied composition in Paris and returned to the United States, influencing other American luminaries such as Ned Rorem, Leonard Bernstein, and John Cage.

Cathedral Foundation Organ Campaign Turning "Pipe" Dreams Into Reality

Most pipe organs have stops that undulate when two stops are pulled together, causing an ethereal effect. These are mostly known as *celestes* (heavenly). The sound of vibrating strings is made by drawing the *viole de Gambe* (a stop mimicking an early violin) and *voix celestes* (literally, "heavenly voice," the stop is intentionally out of tune to create the undulating effect). The gallery organ has another set of undulating pipes: the *dulciane* ("little sweetness," a soft string stop)—the *unda maris* ("wave of the sea," an intentionally out of tune, soft string stop).

Catechesis

Catechesis designates religious education. The term is derived from the Greek *eche* (echo), in the sense of the Catholic faith "resounding" by means of instruction. Religious education is available for all ages: children, youth, and adult.

Pope St. John Paul II taught that, "The definitive aim of catechesis is to put people not only in touch but in communion, in intimacy, with Jesus Christ: only He can lead us to the love of the Father in the Spirit and make us share in the life of the Holy Trinity" (*Catechesi tradendae*, no. 5 §3).

Last Week in Catechesis

Children's Liturgy of the Word (9:00 am Mass) continues through May 18. The children gather at the Mary altar right before the First Reading and exit the church to hear the Word of God and discuss the readings in an engaging lesson with other children ages 3 to 7. The children return to the church for the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

Easter Duty

"All the faithful, after they have been initiated into the Eucharist, are obliged to receive Holy Communion at least once a year. This precept must be fulfilled in paschal time, but for a just cause it may be fulfilled at another time of year" (*Code of Canon Law*, canon 920).

This Easter duty applies to all who have made their First Holy Communion and who are properly disposed to receive the Eucharist. In the United States, the Easter Duty must be fulfilled between Palm Sunday (April 13) and Trinity Sunday (June 15).

The obligation to receive the sacrament of Penance is related to the Easter duty: "After having reached the age of discretion [approximately age seven], each member of the faithful is obliged to confess faithfully his or her grave sins at least once a year" (canon 989).

Receiving Holy Communion

Catholics are obligated to attend Mass on Sundays and on holy days of obligation but are not obligated to receive Holy Communion (*Code of Canon Law*, canon 1247).

The Church encourages the faithful to receive Holy Communion as frequently as possible, if they are properly disposed (Instruction on Eucharistic Worship, *Eucharisticum mysterium*, no. 37). The proper disposition includes fasting from food and drink (except for water and medicine) for one hour prior to receiving the Eucharist (canon 919 §1). A person aware of having committed a grave (mortal) sin must first confess his or her sins in the sacrament of Penance before receiving Holy Communion (canon 916).

Adult Confirmation

Classes are available for adults seeking Confirmation. This sacrament is a special outpouring of the Holy Spirit that strengthens a person to live out the Catholic faith (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, nos. 1285, 1302–1303).
